TAKING STOCK OF EUROPEAN MEMORY POLICIES

Brussels, June 1, 2018 - The European Observatory on Memories (EUROM) of the University of Barcelona and the House of European History (HEH) organize a joint conference in Brussels to discuss the role of the policies of the past for the democratic improvement of European societies. The meeting is open to the public and will take place on June 5, 2018, at the House of European History, bringing together academicians, representatives of organizations and trans-European networks of memory, and those responsible for memory policies at a European level. The meeting also aims to highlight the work developed by active players in the field of memory. The assistance is free, but prior registration is required.

The event will begin at 9 a.m. with a visit to the permanent exhibition of the House of European History, guided by **Martí Grau**, commissioner at the HEH. It will be followed by a welcome session at 11 a.m. with the participation of **Constanze Itzel**, Head of Unit, House of European History, and **Jordi Guixé**, director of EUROM. The opening keynote, titled "A broader view on politics of memory", will be delivered by **Peter Vermeersch**, professor at the University of Louvain and senior researcher at the Institute for International and European Politics (IIEB).

The first round table will be formed by representatives of the European Commission and is scheduled to begin at 11,45 a.m. The debate will revolve around the challenges of the Europe for Citizens Program. Linked to the Executive Agency of Education, Audiovisual and Culture (EACEA), the program is one of the entities responsible for the financing of memory projects at European level. The debate will include the contributions of **Pavel Tychtl**, Police officer at the DG Home, European Commission, and **Gilles Pelayo**, Head of Unit of the Europe for Citizens Program (EACEA).

The afternoon session will begin at 2.30 pm with the contribution of **Michael Cramer**, Member of the European Parliament (Green / AEP), who will analyze the trans-European memorial heritage practices through the "[The Iron Curtain Trail](#)" project. His speech will be followed by a roundtable with Members of the European Parliament. Starting at 3.30 pm. It will be chaired by MEP **Miguel Urbán Crespo** (GUE-NGL), featuring the participation of the MEPs

Ana Maria Gomes, Izaskun Bilbao Barandica, and Ana Miranda Paz, members of the Transnational Group of Historical Memory of the European Parliament.

The final roundtable will begin at 5,00 pm and will present the best practices developed by memory projects and networks in Europe. Moderated by **Anna Cozzoli**, Head of Sector, Europe for Citizens Program (EACEA), the table aims to present the civil society's expectations for the future of memory policies in Europe. It will count with the contributions of the representatives of the European Memo Observatory (EUROM), Memorial de la Shoah, European Network Remembrance and Solidarity (ENRS), and The Beit Project. The meeting will conclude with observations and proposals at 6:30 p.m.

Keynote Speakers:

[Peter Vermeersch](#) is a professor in the Social Sciences associated with LINES (Leuven International and European Studies). He has further acted as a visiting scholar at the Minda de Gunzburg Center for European Studies in 2007 and 2008. Topics of his research include minority politics, nationalism, democratization, and restorative justice. These topics are also reflected in some of his literary works, such as *Ex* (2014), which consisted of literary reportage about the former Yugoslavia, *The Romani Movement* (2016), and his co-edited book *The EU-Enlargement and Gay Politics* (2016). Vermeersch has further written for a wide number of literary and news magazines, and various academic journals.

[Michael Cramer](#) is a Member of the European Parliament and member of the Greens/EFA Parliamentary Group. Since the beginning of his term he has acted as a member of the Committee on Transport and Tourism. During his keynote Cramer will discuss the *Iron Curtain Trail*, a 6,800 km cycle trail along the length of the former Iron Curtain border. The trail invites people to retrace and experience the former division of the continent, and aims to combine European culture, history, and sustainable tourism. The trail overlaps with what has been termed the “Green Belt”, the ironic biotope consisting of 150 natural parks, 150 flora-and-fauna areas, three biosphere reservations Schaarse, Elbaue and the Rhoen, and the National Park of the Harz Mountains, that has developed in the former “Death Strip” between East and West Germany.
